
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### Wednesday, February 17 Ash Wednesday OUTREACH FOR HOPE

Hello, and a blessed lent to you today as we begin this journey, 40 days of Lent, and the weeks of Lent moving towards Holy Week and the Easter celebration on April 5. We take this





time during Lent to reflect, to think about how God is walking with us each and every day of our lives... and at Outreach for Hope we've created a different focus on this. Throughout the days of Lent, our focus is going to be looking at giving. "What does it mean to give?" That's the theme. "What does it mean to give?", and it's that question for us, as people of faith, to wrestle with during the days of Lent.

We've prepared videos for you-- 40 videos from our Ministry Partners, all the different ministries that are associated with Outreach for Hope, are many of our central city churches, doing incredible work. We have churches in Racine and Kenosha as well, and they'll be sharing reflections from their leaders there, talking about giving and what does it mean for them? And how does that get lived out in their own lives?

For me, as I think about giving-- my faith, my theology always starts with creation, starting with who God is. I wanted to read from Psalm 19. This is one of those powerful psalms that talks about God as creator: "The Heavens Declare the Glory of God, the skies proclaim the work of God's hands. Day after day they pour forth speech, Night after night, they reveal knowledge, they have no speech, they use no words, no sound is from them. Yet their voice goes out into all the earth their words, into the ends of the earth world. In the heavens, God has pitched a tent for the sun. It is like a Bridegroom coming out of his chamber, like a champion, rejoicing to run his course, he rises at one end of the heavens and makes it circuit to the other, nothing is deprived of its warmth."

That sense of God as creator...how, when we think about giving, we realize that we have been given so much in each and every breath, and our health, and our living, our day-to-day, each day. As my father used to say, each day is a blessing. Recognizing that each day as we rise, we have been blessed with new opportunities, new choices, new hours in the day to live as people of God, to experience life and all of its beauty-- even with the cold that we are experiencing now. And maybe by the time we hit the end of Lent, it'll be beautiful again, we hope and pray.

We recognize that God blesses us each and every day with the goodness of life. Each breath, each movement, each reflection. We have time during Lent to take some reflection, and think about our own giving. How do we respond to the blessings God has given to us each and every day? With our strength, with our knowledge, with our gifts and abilities, that we may resemble what God has done for us, sharing those good gifts in our own lives?

And so as we begin this Lenten journey, I encourage you to really reflect on what does it mean to give for you. What does it mean to give in your time, talent and treasures, just as we've first been given?

I'll end with the famous words from that same song, Psalm 19: "May these words of my mouth and this meditation of my heart be pleasing in your sight? Oh, Lord, my rock and my Redeemer." May these words of our mouths, as we go through Lent, and the meditations of our hearts be pleasing to God as we reflect on what it means to give.

God's blessings on this Lenten journey may be a powerful reminder of God's goodness in your life, of how God walks with us each and every day... and as we move towards the Easter event, may we be blessed to recognize and understand how much God loves us. Have a great Lent!

#### As you go about your day today, what does giving mean to you?



### Friday, February 19 ALL PEOPLES CHURCH, MILWAUKEE

See, this was the year of blessing in spite of COVID... Well, Linda Muth and I like to say because of COVID, perhaps. We have been trying for years to create a resource where our produce





stand where we give all of our produce out for free-- the kids decided that over six years ago, they didn't want to charge anybody or even ask for gifts. Well, we've been trying to get other gardeners and farmers to give us their leftovers. And for years they didn't really respond. Well, this year being COVID we suddenly received this inundation of people offering. Steve from St. Olaf's set it up with 13 gardeners and two farmers that they would give us their extra produce. And it was a lot! When I went out thinking we'd be harvesting the gleanings of the corn, I was told by the farmer that, "Oh no, one of our members from the church bought the seed so that I could plant them for you and a few other churches." Just for us! Not the gleanings, not the leftovers, but the first fruits.

With that, people who came to the stand would notice that, "Boy, you have a lot more vegetables and things we know you don't grow here." A lot of pumpkins and large squash. And we would share the story of St. Olaf and the gardeners... And then we found we had four more gardeners in our own community that were sharing! They had too many cucumbers or too many zucchini, and they were bringing them over to our garden table.

After eight weeks we stopped the produce bags [due to] the quarantine, and we went on to have two weeks off and then we opened up Tuesday through Friday, in the afternoons, noon to five to hand out produce. I was a little concerned about that, because with COVID and quarantines and people not being able to be around, how was I going to do this without being out there 24/7? Pastor Lindsey was very concerned about that! But then very quickly we found that we had neighbors who wanted to come and take turns, socially distanced, and they wanted to be part of it. And Kathy and Tammy and Shannon and Veronica... a couple from the church, [but] mostly neighbors, started showing up to take their turn at the table.

We had this little thing we called the COVID Shuffle and it was where we would bring up whatever the person asked for, and then we would step away so that they could come up and get it and we wouldn't be within six feet of each other. It's really funny because it was in a time when people were very upset about social distancing and there was a lot of negative energy about that... and God provided this silly dance that we would do, and people would just crack up! And even our ladies from the Clara Mohammed School would come over, and they would turn to people and explain, "You have to do the COVID Shuffle!" And then they would stand there and they'd do the little dance forward for their produce and dance back... It was just fun to see a neat spirit come out of something that was so hard for so many people, and so scary...


It's been a tough year! But God has definitely come forward and just shared blessings upon blessings... and as we say at the garden table, layers of blessings.

I've seen giving like this quite often at Unity Lutheran Church in Milwaukee. Recently, it was a guest who came to our Food Pantry. To honor her anonymity, I'll refer to her as Avah. The next day after coming to Unity's Food Pantry, Avah returned to Unity's building. However, this time the building was vacant and dark. The temperatures outside were dropping close to zero. Avah had returned to sleep outside where our Pantry distributes food.

The next morning, a member of Unity named Chad came to shovel snow. This pandemic has brought challenges for Chad, but he's also found new ways to give through his calling in Jesus' ministry. When Chad spotted Avah, he introduced himself and struck up a conversation. Avah didn't know what to do, or where to go for help. Chad gave her a blanket and a bottle of water. Then he called and asked me if I could contact Street Angels. I let him know that Street Angels would be there in an hour. Chad told Avah not to worry, because God was working to bring her help.

When Street Angels arrived, Avah exclaimed, "God sent angels to help me!" She joyfully dropped everything to go with them. They drove her to a safe and warm place to stay. Later Street Angels asked me to thank Chad for the relationship he developed with Avah, because that built up trust in her to receive from them the help she needed.

Giving of ourselves, imitating God, living in love, following Jesus. It's noticing people and caring. It's being involved in life together and developing relationships. And when that trust reveals the gift presented, it's seeing that God is the source of all good gifts we truly need.

#### As you go about your day today, what does giving mean to you?



Hello! This Rev. Jonathan Barker down here at Grace Lutheran Church in Kenosha. I'm the co-founder of Grace Welcome Center and Pastor here, and when I think about generosity, my generosity hero has always been Barnabas.





Barnabas sold one of his fields and brought the proceeds to the disciples' feet. And not only did Barnabas do this, but so did other members of the early Jerusalem church, the first that did this. And by their incredible act of generosity, we read that "there was not a single needy person among them" in the early first Jerusalem church.

I've always loved that story. I've always loved Barnabas. He's named "Son of Encouragement." I think about how encouraging generosity can be.

This past December, not only did we have roof leaks here at Grace, we also had boiler issues on three separate occasions in December. The third time we had it, I wish I could say I was standing firm in faith and so confident that everything would work out... but the third time in three weeks when the boilers were down, my own spirits dipped. I posted a video just begging for help to cover the cost of getting our boiler repaired.

And within five minutes, somebody stepped up and said, "I will cover the whole cost of the boiler."

That was one of the most encouraging things that has ever happened to me in my ministry. Their gift helped keep Grace Welcome Center pantry going, kept our breakfast program going, kept our diaper program going, kept our worshiping going — it kept it all going because somebody stepped up and was a Son of Encouragement like Barnabas.

Later, I learned that that person didn't really have a lot of money to do this. This was a gift of extreme sacrifice for them. Yet it kept our ministry going. And I could not be more grateful.

When I think about generosity, I think about the bold generosity of this person that brought this money forth for our boilers, I think about Barnabas. I think about how that encourages the ministry of God's people, encourages those doing the ministry, and I think about how God's kingdom continues to spread.




#### As you go about your day today, what does giving mean to you?



I'm so grateful to be in this with all of you. And so when I give the gifts I have to share, and you give the gifts you have to share, then there is sufficiency for all of us.



So if you have the availability or opportunity to increase your giving financially-- it would be a blessing to you, as well as a blessing to someone else in need!


Proverbs 11:25 says "a generous person will prosper; whoever refreshes others, will be refreshed." Thanks be to God!

Hi! I'm Pastor Delaney Schlake-Kruse, and I'm the pastor of St. Paul's Lutheran Church at 28th and Wisconsin Avenue on the near west side of Milwaukee. At St. Paul's, we have received a grant this year from Outreach for Hope that helps us to give hospitality gifts to organizations in our neighborhood.

Our neighborhood is full of beautiful organizations and ministries who are serving the children of God among us - places like Neighborhood House, Pathways High School, the Department of Children and Family Services, and many houses of worship.

All of those places have staff people, and so this year we asked for a grant so that we could give the gift of hospitality to the people around us in things like coffee, or a basket of bagels, or some fruit, or just some gift that we can share.

Once a month, we'll choose a different organization to bring a hospitality gift with the help of Outreach for Hope. And so when I was thinking about "what does it mean to give?", I thought about this grant that we received this year, and these words from Jesus in Matthew, chapter 11- "Jesus said, Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy. And my burden is light."

One of the gifts that we receive from God, this gift that's promised to us by Jesus, is the gift of rest. This is something we receive in the Sabbath, every time we take a breath, and take a break, and stop worrying so much about productivity, and rest in the gracious embrace of God.

And so this year at St. Paul's, we are seeking to continue the work of Jesus by giving the gift of rest, of an eased burden to the people around us who are sharing their time and

#### As you go about your day today, what does giving mean to you?



same. But love your enemies, do good, and lend, expecting nothing in return." Luke 6:32-33, 36






For the past several years, the ministry team of Breaking the Chains Church has assembled simple gift bags for distribution to the men incarcerated at the Felmers Chaney Correctional Center and the staff just before Christmas. The bags include simple things that most of us would take for granted and wouldn't even think of as gifts at all-- like a few cookies, peanut butter and crackers, prepackaged beef sticks, and a couple of stamped cards for the men to connect with the outside world. Otherwise, many of the men there are estranged from family and friends, and wouldn't receive any Christmas gifts if not for these simple "gifts."

Being incarcerated at Christmas can be a very difficult and lonely time. Some people might say that these men are criminals and are receiving the punishment they deserve. [But] I am always amazed by the generosity of people throughout the Greater Milwaukee Synod who volunteer to contribute to the bags while realizing that they will most likely never get to meet any of the recipients or hear how thankful they are when they receive them.


#### As you go about your day today, what does giving mean to you?



There's a commercial on TV right now that I just really love. It shows two little girls sitting on the floor in their bedroom with a plate of Hershey's chocolate between them. And the announcer says, "Take a piece of

chocolate if you're the tallest. Take a piece of chocolate if you're better at eating your vegetables". And then the third question is the kicker. "Take a piece of chocolate, if you love sharing", and both little girls pause and one finally one leans forward and picks up a piece of chocolate and sweetly hands it to the other little girl. If only our giving was always that generous, and that heart, felt, and so joyful.

So often I think we view giving as an obligation. It's your responsibility as a Christian, right? But a sense of duty is not what motivates truly Christian giving. We give because God first gave to us so freely and so generously. We give because we've been so freely loved and forgiven. As James Harnish once wrote, "We give back to God, what is God's, so that through our gifts, the love of God can become a tangible reality in our world".

May your giving of money, of possessions, of time, of energy - truly reflect the reality of God's love in our world.



important to me, to the communities I am involved with, and to the issues and causes that I care about.



#### As you go about your day today, what does giving mean to you?





### Wednesday, March 10 OUTREACH FOR HOPE

Good Morning. For our devotion today, I wanted to think a little bit about what it feels like to be in need.

Professor John Dominic Crossan tells a story of when he was teaching in seminaries. He taught [in] seminaries





around the world. [At] three different ones, specifically-- one in America, one in Russia, and one in Tanzania. And he tells about sharing the prodigal son story, and then asking people about it.

So I just want to read this section from the prodigal son story from Jesus: So Jesus says, there was a man who had two sons. The younger of them said to his father, "Father, give me the share of the property that will belong to me." So the father divided his property between the two sons. A few days later, the younger son gathered all he had and traveled to a distant country. And there, he squandered his property in dissolutely living. When he had spent everything, a severe famine took place throughout that country, and he began to be in need. So he went and hired himself out to one of the citizens of that country, who sent him out to his fields to feed the pigs. The son thought he would gladly have filled himself with the pods that the pigs were eating, but no one gave him anything to eat.

What does it mean to be in need? When John Dominic Crossan asked his students in these three different countries, "Tell me about this story? What is it about this young man that has him in such great need?" In America, they all pointed to the fact that "he had squandered his property in dissolute living," it says so right in the text. And we can give all sorts of definitions to that.

When he was in Russia, he asked that same question to his seminary students. He said, "So what is it about this, that the young man is suddenly finding himself in need?" And they all pointed to something completely different. They pointed to another part of the text where it said that "a severe famine took place throughout that country." In Russia, they had had many famines. They knew what it meant to be in great need, needing to be fed.

When he went to Tanzania, he asked his seminary students there that same question: "What is it about this story that finds this young man in great need?" And they all pointed to a whole different part of this same text, and they said, "because no one shared with him."

I had a chance to be in Tanzania several times. And I've seen how people share. The people in greatest need have so little-- maybe they're a widow, or maybe they found themselves in a very bad physical state where they're [physically disabled] and cannot really take care of themselves. People take care of one another. They help each other through all that they go through.

I experienced this in my life. One time, my father developed Leukemia out of nowhere...and was in great need. And I remember that sense of need to have my father healed. Unfortunately, he was never healed this side of heaven, but we knew that great need. There was nothing we could do to take care of my father, nothing we could do to help heal him. We had to lean on the doctors and nurses, we had to lean on the medicine, we had to lean on so many of our friends and our church. People cared for us and helped us through that incredibly difficult time for about six months.

That feeling of being in need, it's a helpless feeling. You can't do anything about it yourself. You really, truly need, as the text says, to rely on others-- and just as this younger son experienced, we felt that as a family as my dad was dying. And I remember the appreciation we had for people who took care of us, who helped us, who in so many small ways made such a difference for us.

Giving is about that, isn't it? It's about sharing and caring and being there for one another. Sometimes, it's about being there for people we've never met. It's a calling for us as Christians, as people of faith, to remember when Jesus taught us "to love one another as we would love ourselves," to care for others and to reach out and be there for one another.

As we go through Lent - this question keeps coming up for us - What does it mean to give? What does it mean to be in need? As we think about the needs of our siblings in Christ all around us, we are reminded through our simple actions, to reach out and care for one another just as Jesus has already done for us.

#### As you go about your day today, what does giving mean to you?

**PRAYER** | Dear great and gracious God: We thank you for this new day, this new opportunity for us to think about how we can help someone else that's going through a great need today. We've experienced it in our own lives-- times where we've needed that help. We know how our siblings around us have helped us, and how you have helped us. O Lord, bless us to be able to return the favor in our small acts of kindness and love. We thank you, and we lift up your name for all that you do for us today, and tomorrow, and every day. May we continue to be the church and care for one another in great and small ways. In your name we pray, Amen.

#### As you go about your day today, what does giving mean to you?



My name is Charles Williams and I am



So, four years ago, walking through those doors changed my life.



**SONJA WOLFE:** Well, I've been thinking about it since we first talked about it, and I've just had a hard time putting my head around what I feel about giving-- just because I've had a lot of personal challenges lately. And I've had some really hard struggles, especially in the last several weeks with a lot of changes going on, and I really needed help. And because I wasn't in the receiving state of mind, I wasn't taking the blessings all around me that God continues to walk with me, and putting the things that I needed in my path. But because I wasn't thinking that, "Wait a minute I need to receive," I was shutting off my blessings.

**CHRIS:** Yeah, that's a great way to say it-- shutting off the blessings.

**SONJA:** I think that once I remembered that I needed to let go and let God, I felt better, I immediately just felt peace.

**CHRIS:** It's a two-way street, isn't it? Giving is a two-way street. It's not just a one-way. It's being open to that receiving as well. Recognizing that we are united, we are a community, and to give is also remembering to receive? And I like what you said, being humbled to it, being open to it, and that it's a blessing to receive.

**SONJA:** Yeah, that's right. I'm fighting things that I don't need to fight. Wrestling with things I don't need to wrestle with, because it's not my problem.




I've learned over the years that I actually get more out of giving than those that receive.

In addition, his hearing aids failed and the place that could fix them was outside of the bus line. To spend time with his children, he needed help transporting them from their mom's house to his house. Breaking the Chains [Church] volunteers stepped in to help!

Embracing a lifestyle of true generosity is difficult. The Bible reminds us over and over again to be generous, but it doesn't really define how generous.

Maybe we should then look at Jesus's own words and actions. Breaking the Chains [Church] uses Matthew 25 as our guide: "Truly I tell you, whatever you did not do for one of the least of these, you did not do for me." Giving to others is an extension of Jesus's ministry.

As you go about your day today, what does giving mean to you?





The other day, somebody asked me, "What is giving?" Well, the first thing I had to do was go to the dictionary. And





I looked up the word. It said it was "one, a charitable gesture; two, a philanthropic Act; or three, generosity." With that said, I think it's really a lot more than that. And here's why.

As a young girl, I was involved in Girl Scouting, which is a program embraced by our parochial school. Throughout the years of age seven to high school, we learned about giving through service projects, which were always part of our activities. The projects were as simple as making tray favors for residents of a nursing home, or making handmade Valentine cards for people who needed to know that other people cared about them. Now, so many years later, I look forward to every Tuesday morning when a group of us mask up and drive to a food warehouse with our SUVs to gather meals for hungry families in our city.



CROSS MEMBER: -- And it's fun!


**CHRIS:** It is. There's something about working together as a team and as a community and for a good cause that really does make yourself feel good. Joy comes in giving, right?



**CHRIS:** The things that they give really do make a difference?



This is an extremely wonderful ministry as we serve the greater Uptown area and those in Kenosha who are desperately in need of help.

Today I want to talk to you about giving. One of our long-time supporters, County Supervisor Andy Berg, had some time available. He was planning a vacation, and he wasn't able to go through with it, so he thought, "Let me help Grace Welcome Center." And he planned "Freezin' for a Reason." He didn't know the name of it; he didn't know exactly what was going to happen. But he came to us and said he would like to camp out. We worked with him on this idea. He got three other individuals who slept with him outdoors in tents for three nights.

This week, you can see the results of that behind me. We have at least 6,000, maybe 8,000 pounds of food. And behind Pastor, there are also toiletries, feminine hygiene products, all sorts of things that we need and we go through all the time here at the Center. So his little idea, if you want to think of it, is: Jesus talked about, is your faith as strong as a mustard seed? It was a small idea at first. And really, once planted, it got nurtured and it grew into this. A simple idea grew into thousands of pounds of food, which will help us each week for some time to come.

#### As you go about your day today, what does giving mean to you?





To give in this way honors the body of Christ as Paul describes it in his letter to the Romans. Intentional, relational giving, whether the gift is tangible or intangible, honors the truth that "we, who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually we are members of one another" (Romans: 12:5).

To give is to sustain this beautiful body of Christ that surrounds us and includes us. So stop. Look around. Appreciate. Give. Receive.





I'm the Garden Educator at All Peoples Church, and I've been here nine seasons now, coming up on my tenth. But I really wanted to focus on this last season, with COVID.

When COVID first hit and we had the quarantine, I went to Pete's Fresh Fruit Market and spoke with their manager, Videl, about being able to resource their produce for our people here. We wanted to set up a site where people could come and they would get pre-made bags of produce and dairy each week on Wednesday. And that went on for eight weeks. Pastor Lindsey was able to get us a grant for that, so we were fully funded. And Videl from Pete's Market gave us a wonderful deal on all of our produce-- usually at cost and sometimes below. For me that was just the epitome of the beginning of COVID, and the outreach of gifting from so many... that they would do that even though they needed to be making the money. That they would care about the community. And when we received more funding and said we could pay regular price, Pete's Market said, "No. We want to keep taking care of the community."

That was just the beginning. I say that because we started to come up with an idea around here that it was the 'layers and layers of blessing'... from COVID. And it went on to be things like Ramona, one of our neighbors who was blessed by some of the produce, asking if she could help out in the garden. She loved the zinnias. So she spent the next two months planting zinnias in each of our beds along the edges so the butterflies and bees would pollinate. It was delightful to see her out there, especially since Ramona shared that she had to take her medicine the night before if she wanted to be able to walk and bend well enough to do it-- but it was very important to her! So that was very special.

And with that came layering and layering! We had Pam, who wanted to come help in the garden because she could no longer help at the other place she was working. And she would come and she would just do random acts of kindness! Anything I would leave on a list for her. She would harvest product or clean up the hoses-- even into the winter, she was coming every Tuesday.

The layering continued. We had Dr. Tom who wanted to come harvest, and do some crazy things that nobody else would want to do. We had a couple couples from St. John's in Brookfield come out. And I love the fact that Mr. Miller wanted to repair our garden boxes that were falling apart. So he would come and his wife, Mary, would pull weeds wherever she could find them (and we have quite a plethora!). And then he would choose a box or two that he wanted to repair. Such a blessing! When was I going to have the time? And who was I gonna find to do that? Well, God provided again.

Well, as I told Pastor Chris, it's very likely that I will forget many stories of the layering. But it still comes up to my whole crew... when they're out there, something will happen and they'll say, "Ah-- layers of blessings!"







And I was getting hungry, and didn't know where to turn. I couldn't think of anybody to call. I didn't seem to have a memory of friends or phone numbers or any way to get myself out of the situation. This was really a horrible experience.

[Then] some people came along in my dream and helped me. They offered their phone to make some calls. They called some resources to get me what I needed, and there was that sense of thankfulness for what they were doing.

[When] I think about this dream, I think about how difficult [it is for] people all around us in our own communities. Many experience this same kind of struggle, as they have very little resources to draw upon whether it's [because of] the pandemic, or just all the circumstances of life. [They] have found themselves like [I did in] that dream-- not sure where to turn, and what to do or who to call, and really needing to lean on others for support and care.

It reminds me of a quote by Father Gregory Boyle, the author of Tattoos On the Hearthe's someone that worked with and helped gang members get out of gangs by showing them God's love, care and compassion. As he dealt with people that were often struggling under the weight of poverty, he said, "Here's what we seek. A compassion that stands in awe of what the poor have to carry, rather than standing in judgment, and how they carry it."

Stand with compassion, in awe of what the poor have to carry. Can you imagine the great difficulty that so many of our siblings in Christ go through each and every day? Not sure where to turn to feed their family? Can you imagine what it must be like to not have the resources to feed your family?

This theme that we've been going through is talking about generosity. How do we think about caring for our brothers and sisters all around us? How do we think about the generosity we've experienced ourselves? The gratitude we have when people help usand what does that mean to then turn and share that same kind of generosity and gratitude with others? That we may truly understand ourselves as linked together, walking together, through the good and the bad of life, helping each other, walking the road that is before us.

So as we reflect on that today, let us think about all that we've been blessed with and how God has called us to also be a blessing to others. May you have a great day today, and I hope that God continues to use you to be a blessing in this world that needs it so desperately.
