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Wednesday, February 22 Ash Wednesday OUTREACH FOR HOPE

Rev. Chris Manke, Executive Director of Outreach for Hope: Hi! I'm Pastor Chris Manke. And I'm excited for our Lenten journey that we're about to start on together!



For the next several weeks, 40 days, we'll have a daily devotion coming out to you from Outreach for Hope. We've had 40 different people sharing their thoughts and their reflections on this theme for this year, which is "God sightings," this idea of, "how do we see God in our world?" And I'm convinced part of our problem is that we stop looking for God. We stop looking for God's presence in our lives and thinking about, "How is God active in my life? What is God doing in and through me, and all the things that I do on a day-to-day basis?"

Some of you might know that I'm a photographer. I enjoy doing photography, and taking lots of pictures everywhere I go, and sharing those. But I'm always amazed as I reflect on those pictures, as I see them, I see how God is at work, how God is with me. And as I look at them later, it always strikes me.

Often, we think about God's presence at times in our lives when things are going really well. In times of, like, the birth of a child, or the celebration of a moment in life. And we think to ourselves, "Thank you, God! Thank you, God, for the goodness of this moment" of how God has been with us in those times. And we celebrate, just like our ancestors in the faith that we hear about in scripture. But it's also in those times of great difficulty where we think, "Oh, wow, how am I going to get through this?" And then especially as we reflect on those times, looking back, we see how God was with us, how God took care of us. In all of those little moments, maybe through a friend's presence, or someone reaching out to us, or our church faith community being there with us. Those celebrations and those difficulties remind us about how God is with us each and every day.

And so, this Lenten devotion, my encouragement for you, is to think about how God is with us each and every day. To look for God's presence in our lives, the reminders that there are no coincidences, that God is walking with us, and often doing those things that remind us of God's goodness, God's presence, God's love in our lives. And so, my hope for you, as we go through these next weeks of Lent, moving us towards the Easter

moment, is that we will look for God. That we will see God's presence in our day to day, sometimes in the very small things, and sometimes in the very big. But we know God is walking with us. And so, blessings to you on this journey that we are starting, and may you keep looking for God's presence in your life! Amen.

As you go about your day today, how do you see God at work?

Thursday, February 23 GREATER MILWAUKEE SYNOD

Rev. Afi Dobbins-Mays, Assistant to the Bishop for Authentic Diversity & Leadership: This week, in reflecting on a God sighting to share, I was struck by how it seems such a monumental thing

to experience—going inward to reflect and draw up a memory of a time that I saw God moving. I was feeling the pressure to come up with something powerful and grand that can capture sometimes those amazing and overwhelming feelings of awe... Yet, again, as I thought about Lent, and how we turn our eyes to the road that Jesus travelled, I think about how it was one with its own share of family trauma and drama, his journey. It was a journey that was fraught with the expectations, frustrations and failings of people and institutions, which ultimately signed his death warrant. I'm reminded that Christ's journey also led him by the seashores, and over still waters, and even up mountains. It led him through storms. Throughout his ministry, signs and wonders followed him. And often in between, he can be found in a posture of listening and praying, sitting with God.

As we journey this year with Christ, through the traumas we have endured... despite any number of things that might have frustrated us, and also, despite the people and institutions that may fail us at times... Still, there are the moments in which we can go away, or come to the mountain, and feel God and God's presence.

This week, in this season, I've seen God in the clear, bright light of the moon, and the cool, crisp winter air. I've seen God in the laughter of a loved one whose struggle has been so deep, that even a smile was difficult. I've heard God in the chirping of the birds, and the dripping of the melting ice and snow.

Winans, a gospel group that was popular in the 80's and 90's, sing of God. They say everything God touches is a song. And they say God, you touched my life one day, and my burdens, they just rolled away.

I pray that in this season, we might all meet Christ by the water. Or when we first step out of the door and feel the breeze or the wind on our cheeks. In the eyes of a friend, or in the eyes of a stranger. That we'll see God everywhere we look because Christ touched our lives one day. The Lord be with you!

And I'm just so mindful how, not only was this volunteer able to live this out-- but all the people that donate jackets and clothing and long underwear and food to Grace Welcome Center, living out this command to share with those that don't have. Tuesday, February 28 HOSPITALITY CENTER, RACINE OFH Ministry Partner

Carl Fields, Director of Community Engagement: Well, my name is Carl Fields. I'm the Director of Community Engagement here at the Hospitality

Center in Racine, Wisconsin. And one of the things that we do is, plain and simple, we invite people into the space. And we do so in order to build community. It's a great opportunity to live the faith, walk the values that we talk so much about. I myself am a community organizer, so I come to the work in a way that has a lens of social justice. And I try to live my life out loud in a way that works. And I have a good time with it. The program has been in existence for some time now, almost 12 years, and one of the things about doing this work is that we meet people where they are. And when there are successes, we lift them up, and we hold them high.

There was one particular person that we've been walking with, a guy who was what they would call "street homeless." And he was homeless for some time -- years, in fact. But with Hospitality Center being available to him, he built connections here with us -- myself, the pastor, and our program manager, Pamela. He also was connected to HOPES Center, which is a partner here in downtown Racine, and part of what we call "the continuum of care" here in Racine. We were able to ultimately walk with him long enough to help him make a decision to not be homeless. When the resources came, he was able to get an apartment and he took it. And so now he lives in an apartment. He's doing well. He still drops by to see us, let us know how he's doing. So those particular updates are key. But it also empowers others: on not just how to do it, but here's someone to do it with. And here is the community systems that helped me to do this, and that is just... man! That's something. To see that. To be a part of that. And for me, it's something I get to do every day. I'm grateful for that.

As you go about your day today, how do you see God at work?

PRAYER | God, creator and redeemer of all things: Without you, nothing is holy, and nothing that is profane is beyond redemption. Send your grace into our lives, so we might have the courage to live them out loud, turning those things over to you that bring us shame, and lifting up those things that make you proud. Jeff Bray, Music Director: So, the question is, "Where have I seen God working in my life?" Well, I had an experience where I met Jesus in a



homeless man. My life had, before Christmas, was kind of chaotic... I'm a contractor. So, I had some work, and I had a difficult client that wanted to argue with me over my invoice and disputed my claims of the hours that I worked... And, you know, I've been doing this work for 20 years. And I guess as it were, we met at a Colectivo on one of the coldest days of the year. And I arrived a little early to meet this guy, and to give him his lien waivers so that I couldn't put a lien on his house from not paying what I asked him to pay. So, he gave me his check, and I gave him his lien waiver. And I ended up running into a homeless man who came over to me, and in my kind of, disturbance, he asked me how I was... And I didn't know what to make of it! And he asked me for money, of course. I gave him \$5. And... but he stayed. He stayed and he stood with me. Again, he asked me how I was, and that usually doesn't happen. And he seemed dizzy, and he put his head down. I said, "Would you like to sit with me?" And then when I invited him to sit with me, then he went off to get the food that he could get with the money that I had given him. But I realized at that time, that the money that I wasn't getting paid by this troublesome client, and all the—say, the drama that was between us --it meant nothing. Because I had met Jesus in the form of this homeless man. So that's my Christmas story. That made my Christmas!

As you go about your day today, how do you see God at work?

PRAYER | Lord God: Help us to see you in each other, in the stranger, in the person we meet passing by. Help us to know how deeply you love each of us and call us to love each other as well. Bless us to love each other as you have shown us how to love. In Jesus' name, we pray. Amen.

So, I take my cup of coffee, and in my frustration, I sit down.... And that's when God broke into my morning with such brilliance. The sunrise that morning was just spectacular! And that's when God stirred in my heart those words: "Julie, Julie, you are worried about so many things, but only one thing is needed. Be still and know that I am God!" On that snowy morning in the quiet stillness, God showed up unexpectedly, revealing again God's great faithfulness to us... and if we can be open to it, morning by morning, new mercies I will see.

Steve Spieker, member and OFH Ride Run Walk corporate sponsor: Over 30 years ago, I suffered a bout with depression that lasted several years.

That painful time in my life resulted in me losing my job and having my family, friends and church turn their backs on me. Prior to my diagnosis, I found myself gradually slipping into a state of alcohol dependency. At the time, I thought I just preferred my cocktails over other beverages. I now know habitual alcohol consumption is a common practice of self-medication for someone suffering with depression.

Why am I telling you this? I'd like to share a time with you when God showed up. It's a moment that still takes my breath away whenever I recall it. It happened on a Sunday morning following one New Year's holiday. It was that Sunday when every year, everyone is kind of "churched out" and feels like taking a vacation day. Although my wife Carol and I generally attended worship every Sunday, I remember mulling over the possibility of us just taking a break and sleeping in. Despite us deciding several times we would skip that Sunday, I vividly recall having a strong pull to attend worship that week for some reason. In the end, we decided we had better go. As expected, worship was low in energy, and we tried to trudge through. Finally, it was time for the sermon. To my surprise, the 20-something son of a squeaky clean and wellrespected family approached the pulpit. I recall feeling puzzled as he took his place and took a couple of deep breaths. His first few words were rather weak and uncertain. I wondered what he was there for. After listening for a moment, I realized he was sharing his experience with alcohol dependence. He related how his actions had negatively impacted him and the people around him. He had come to accept he had a problem and was taking steps to overcome his dependence. Initially I thought, "How in the world could something like this happen to someone with the advantages of a great family and privileged upbringing?" In my mind, it seemed like only people with nothing going for them had drinking problems. It didn't take long until I saw my reflection in the words he was speaking. His story was my story.

Upon returning home, I felt emotionally drained. I sat at the end of the bed in my wife's arms. I admitted I was a drunk, and I apologized and cried in her arms for what seemed like hours. From that moment on, I never drank again. Of course, not having the crutch of alcohol made me feel the pain of depression even more. But that same pain and

discomfort was the catalyst for me seeking help and digging myself out of the deep hole that I had fallen into.

Even after all these years later, I still frequently asked myself, where would I be and who would I be if God had not met me in that moment? What would have happened had I not heeded the persuasive tug to go to church on that Sunday? I know it was God reaching out to me because I needed his help. I am reminded that when I expect it least, God is always there to give me what I need.

As you go about your day today, how do you see God at work?

PRAYER | Dear Lord: Thank you for how you walk with us day after day, guiding us, caring for us, helping us to move towards lives of healing and wholeness. May each day be a step with you on paths of goodness and light. In your name, we pray. Amen.

Mary Zorn, Administrative Assistant: My name is Mary Zorn. I work at the ELCA Outreach Center in Kenosha,

sightings," and working at the ELCA Outreach Center, I'm fortunate to, pretty much daily, be able to see God's hands at work in our community.

One of the stories that really touched me was when we had this glove, and it was laying on the counter in the front where people check in. And I go by that glove, and I was like, "What is this glove doing here? This is a very nice glove!" But it was just one glove. I was like, "I don't know what this glove is doing here." And just right after I asked, this man walked in, and he looked at me and he said, "I need a glove." I said, "A glove? Well, I have this one. But I don't know where the match is." And he said, "That's okay, I only need one." He only had one hand. And it just so happened that the glove fit. It was the correct hand for that! And I know that's a simple thing... But it's just like, nobody knew where the glove came from. It just happened to be laying there. Nobody would take credit for putting it there. And it just stayed there, until this man came to claim it. It was really nice to be able to say to him, "I think God had this love here for you."

Things like that happen so often here, that I think we tend to almost take it for granted. And I pray that in this year, and in this Lenten season, that I don't take this for granted, and that I just am always grateful for the times that God just touches us in ways that are miraculous.

As you go about your day today, how do you see God at work?

PRAYER | Dear Lord: You are the finder of lost souls, the one who helps to fill all of our emptiness, the God of those whose need is great. Bless us in our own brokenness that we may be comforted and restored, so that we can then turn to our neighbor as well and share what you have given to us. In your name, we pray. Amen.

Laresha Love, member: The devotion I will be talking about today is a time where I've seen God active in my ministry. And that is a time where

pastor was out of town, actually. And so, we had a guest pastor. And our nurse here, Nurse Chris, is a second set of eyes for the congregation, just making sure that everything's going perfectly, everything's running smoothly. And we actually had a member that was struck by a car outside. And it was very weird because no one heard it in the church. And normally, we hear everything like that. But we didn't hear anything at all. So, Nurse Chris actually handled that by herself with another few members. No one knew what was going on. And then some things was misconstrued with [the worship] service, and things were moved around. So, she just helped us get back on track. And then shortly after, one of our member's blood sugar level dropped.

So after the whole crazy Sunday that we had with Nurse Chris just really being an act of God, and just moving so swiftly and making sure that everyone was alright-- My parents and I went home, and we sat outside, and we just talked about how we really didn't hear anything, how everything was so quiet and everyone was just moving swiftly and under control. That's when we found out that the member was okay, she did sustain a few injuries, but she's back on Zoom worship with us, Sundays at nine. So that's always good to see her face on the screen, we can't wait for her to be back. And the other member, whose blood sugar dropped low-- [Nurse Chris] got him some water, got him outside for some fresh air, and I believe she gave him a piece of candy. He perked right back up. So, he was doing well after that. So, it's just good to have [Nurse Chris] here, to make sure that our members are safe, because we do have a lot of elderly, so it's good to always have her around and near just in case something happens.

And me knowing Nurse Chris-- She actually was a nurse over at Hopkins, Community School, and I attended Hopkins as a kid, and so she was my nurse there. So, coming here, as like a high schooler, as a teen, and knowing her from my elementary days was... it was warm. It's kind of hard coming into a new place that you don't know, with no one, that you don't know. It's uncomfortable... but she definitely made us feel comfortable. So yeah, I've been knowing her since I was like, nine or 10, almost.

As you go about your day today, how do you see God at work?

PRAYER | God of healing, we thank you for the many moments in our lives when you deliver healing to us through those you send to minster to our injuries and diseases, afflictions, and hardships. We bless Nurse Chris and all parish nurses and servants of healing who carry out your good will for health and wellbeing. We pray for those who are suffering from all kinds of harm. In us, your church, your body here on earth, may they find a sign of your care and mercy from your heart. This Lenten season, as we contemplate deeply the wounds of Jesus, may we tend the wounds of others with the compassion of Jesus, and with the knowledge that as we tend our neighbor, we tend him. Lord Jesus, have mercy on us and heal us. Amen.

In one of the Lenten readings from Luke 15:4 Jesus says, "Suppose one of you has a hundred sheep and loses one of them. Doesn't he leave the ninety-nine in the open country and go after the lost sheep until he finds it?

This is a story about Carol. She was lost.... really lost! Her life revolved around alcohol. Little else mattered. Her addiction caused her to travel from state to state trying to find a place to stay. She ruined nearly every family relationship with broken promises and bitter disappointments. She feared being alone. She missed her grandchildren; she was embarrassed by how her children saw her – but still her addiction drove her life. Eventually, there was no more family to run to. She ended up in Racine at a friend's house. Carol quickly got a job and soon lost it due to absenteeism from drinking. Her friend finally said, your only option is medical detox. If you simply stop drinking, you could die! Carol felt like a wretch, lost, her health was in danger, her family had had it, and she felt hopelessly caught in the snare of her desire to drink. No matter how many promises she made to herself she could not seem to keep them. In treatment Carol met a nurse who touched her with kindness and hope. She began to see the light at the end of her challenging journey.

Today, Carol has finished her master's degree in social work and has been clean for three years. She has held the same job for over 2 years and has reestablished her relationship with her children and most especially, her beautiful granddaughter. She volunteers at a women's center in Waukesha, sharing her experience and offering hope to others. She is truly paying it forward!

God never gave up on her and neither did we! God's saving grace restored her to a wholeness she could not have imagined.

As the hymn states, *Amazing grace! How sweet the sound - That saved a wretch like me! I once was lost, but now am found; Was blind, but now I see.*

think... that reminds us to pay attention. That reminds us that even in the valleys in the wilderness of life, God is still present. God comes to us sometimes in simple acts of hospitality or words of blessing.

There are difficulties many of us have with God. Like many others, I often wonder, and I'm baffled by the way, God is running the world. The world often is not gentle for many people. There are many horrors, coming to many people from many different directions. On the other hand, there's great goodness and beauty in the world. Maybe the same vein as this, I wonder how God may be wanting to work through us. As there are words of blessings we are called to speak or acts of hospitality that we're called to share with those we know and love, or even those that we don't know, and maybe no one loves them.

There is the theology that asserts that God comes to us disguised as our own lives. God makes Himself known through the events of our own lives. God made Himself known in my life. Examining my life convinces me that there have been a number of Gods sightings: Unmistakable moments when He revealed Himself. Times when I sense that the Lord has been mindful of me and attended to me.

The Scriptures tell us that mercy is the deepest quality of God's love. There are beautiful words from Lamentations, "The favorites of the Lord are not exhausted, His mercies never come to an end. They are renewed every morning." Again, as I meditate on my life, I can sense the action of God. Those various times, they are his interventions, God sightings. There is a promise of scriptures that God has created an economy in which there is enough for everyone. Gandhi said there is enough for everyone's needs, but not everyone's greed. And John the Baptist reminds us that if we have two tunics, we should give one to people who do not have one.

The God sightings that I see here at Redeemer are, so many people that are doing just that sharing. They're sharing their extra clothes, their extra food, and more importantly, sometimes it's their extra time that they're sharing with people that need it. And we see

the sightings of God in these people... through their hugs and their smiles and their thanks to us. On the other side of this, maybe in the same vein as this, I wonder how often God may be wanting to work through us in our daily lives. Are there words of blessings we are called to speak? Are there people we should be helping -- people we know, or people that we don't even know?

So, I want to leave you with a little homework this week. The first thing I'd like you to do is to look for God sightings as you see them. And then one more thing, that maybe you can become an angel to someone in need.

In your search for truth, focus more on the effort of God's life and his teachings. You will discover that Jesus loves you.

Rev. Matt Short, Assistant to the Bishop for Evangelical Mission: I'm recording this video from Arizona, where I was born and raised. And before I tell you where I see God, both in the desert and in our shared ministry together, I have two passages I



want to read for you. The first a little bit more well known, the second maybe a little bit less well known.


The first one, Galatians 6:9: "So let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest time if we do not give up." The second, Job 14:7-9: "For there is hope for a tree, if it is cut down, that it will sprout again, and that its shoots will not cease. Though its root grows old in the earth, and its stump dies in the ground, yet at the scent of water, it will bud and put forth branches like a young plant."

I love especially that second passage, because it bears witness to one of the places I see God. And that's in the desert. And not just in the natural landscape, but in the way our God works. In the parched places, in the places where we would look at it and say, "This is just dirt. There's no way anything can grow here." No, in fact, seeds are planted. And like that passage from Job, even the scent of water will cause these plants to explode in color. If you've never seen the desert in bloom in the spring, just Google that. It's an incredible thing, because the desert floor erupts in wildflowers. The cactus behind me will put forth beautiful flowers on it at just the scent of water!

I see God in our shared ministry together, and in so many of our congregations where they are daily walking in a reality that might look like a parched place. But they know, they have the faith that God brings the rains, that God's grace and mercy and love show up. And so, I see it in so many of our partnered ministries. In the ways that we don't lose hope. Because we know, like the Galatians passage says, we can't grow weary of doing what is right. Because God will bring the growth. God will bring the spring and the rains and even the scent of water when we need it. I pray that's a blessing for you today from the desert. It certainly is for me.

As you go about your day today, how do you see God at work?

PRAYER | God, we thank you for the ways you keep us going. When the days feel long, and incredibly hard, you are there. When love seems in short supply, you are there. When we feel parched, you are there, giving us what we need to bud and sprout new life again. Help us to receive that new life when we need it, and BE that new life when others need it. Mike Coltrane, Meal Coordinator: This is recently, about two Sundays ago. I work on Sundays. I pick up food from Trader Joe's. There's a guy that's

named... 'Brian', for example. Haven't seen him in a while. So, you know, you kind of think about people you haven't seen in the while. But he told me, he came down and said to say hello to everybody. He told me that he'd stopped drinking, it'd been about two years. He said, when he was drinking and having issues, his mom would not associate with him at all, because she knew that every time he called, it was for money or something that he needed. So, he said, he ain't seen his mom face-to-face for two years, when he was getting this progress change to his future. He found a job, he got a place on his own. He said he went from calling, to texting, to emailing. And the Sunday that he came to talk to me and say this wonderful thing-- that's why I'm bringing it up -he said, "Mike, I want to say thank you so much, because since I've been here, you always acknowledged me as a regular person." He said, "You would give me a hug when I had dirty clothes. You show love and appreciation, never looked down on me." And I said, "You know why? It's because homelessness is something that can be changed. It's something that you can break through, if you choose to make the proper steps." And he said, "Guess what? I'm about to go see my mom for the first time in two years!" So, it's things like that, that makes you be like, you know... This is a purpose. Having a ministry to go forward and look out for people that don't know when their next meal is coming, or don't know the next time they'll be talked to, because people look at people differently when they're in a bad situation. So, having peace and just staying humble. It's gotten me this far, so I'm trying to pass before to somebody else.

Leif Peterson, Executive Director: Good morning. I'm Leif Peterson, Executive Director of Grace Welcome Center. We're in the basement of Grace Lutheran Church in front of one of our walk-in coolers that we



use at our food pantry. I would like to share with you a story that came up this past Tuesday during food distribution.

We had a neighbor who lives right across the street on 20th Avenue, comment to us. She was so appreciative; she got food for the last time. She had been getting food during the pandemic for the last year and a half because she didn't have enough to feed her family. She and her husband could barely get by, and she was unemployed and couldn't get a job.

So we supplemented them, and she came by for food every week. And she just wanted to thank us, and she was extremely excited, because she had just gotten a good-paying job in town, and this was the last time she was going to need food services. So she thanked us profusely for the assistance we have given her so that her children didn't go hungry, and nor did she and her husband.

So, we are just demonstrating a way in which the Holy Spirit and God continues to work through this church and through this program. All of this food that we're distributing is donated. Behind me is the list of names of our volunteers. They come and make this food pantry happen. It takes a lot of dollars, and a lot of volunteer hours to make our pantry happen. We've served 164 families this past week. We went through, I think, about 8,500 or 9,000 pounds of food just this last Tuesday night.

So, thank you for your continued support. We are happy to lift up those in our community, and we are always looking for assistance here. This food pantry is really making a huge difference in this community of Kenosha. Thank you very much.

Jane Prahlow, member: Hi! My name is Jane Prahlow, and I'm a member at St. Paul's Lutheran in Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

My latest God sightings have revolved around my church, and its connection to Our Safe Place. Recently, our small congregation sponsored a Christmas giving tree for Our Safe Place, which is located just around the corner from our church, St. Paul's Lutheran on 28th and Wisconsin, in Milwaukee. Just an ordinary Christmas project for our congregation. The men living there, at Our Safe Place, are in recovery from substance abuse and struggling to find their way. Most have severed ties with their families, and are lonely and sad. Using Outreach funds, St. Paul's first connected with Our Safe Place a few years ago, when we embarked on an explorative journey, searching for a way to reach out in a meaningful way to organize these organizations in our neighborhood.

We met the directors, Bonnie and Andy, and learn more about their nonprofit. We collected towels and sheets to help men who arrive at Our Safe Place with next to nothing. I saw God when some of these men showed up monthly, to help us haul things up from the basement of our church, so we could give out hygiene packets, new clothing, and lunch for the people in our neighborhood.

In December, members of our congregation purchased gifts for some of the men, and we funded other gifts with the money from the Outreach fund. There were lots of God sightings. I saw God as members clustered around the tree, picking out "their guy" to pray over and buy gifts for Christmas. The generosity of our members overwhelmed me! But this and other responses from the men at Our Safe Place left me in awe of how God empowers us to love, and envelops us in an even greater heap of love. I saw God in the responses from the men there. In a thank you, one man wrote that no one had given him a present in years. That's unimaginable in my world, and probably yours. Listen to this thank you note: "May the holidays find each of you growing in the grace and knowledge of our Savior. Your non-judgmental love and support has touched me in ways you will only know when you are called home, and the Lord tells you, "Well done, good and faithful servant!" Thank you for your prayers and support, and my sincere promises to you: I will pay it forward! Shalom and God bless you!" God was

present in every part of this exchange! And we, the congregation of St. Paul's, received more than we gave. God was in the midst of this.

Lent is a time to reflect on our relationship with God, and a time to open our eyes to how God is here with us, right now. It's a time to look around, and see the ordinary, made extraordinary, through God.



So, my success story is, there was a gentleman that came here about... almost three months ago. He was having trouble finding a lawyer and also the money to pay a lawyer. But he came in and heard about our programs, and we were able to help him out. He got all his things that he needed through the court. And about two months later, he came in and he donated the money that he was saving up for a lawyer! And he was grateful that we had a program like this, and he wanted to give back to the community.

So, the furniture would go on the street. So, we say, well, maybe there's some furniture for this young lady that can help with what she needs. Turns out, she was in love with all the furniture. And the next question is, how do we get it from there to her house-- and then all of a sudden, there's a trailer available. And I say, "Well, I have my Jeep and I have a trailer hitch. Maybe I can help." So that's what happened. So, we move all the furniture out of the house and put it into trailers. We drive it to her house. And on the way she sees her son and daughter, I think, are walking on the street, and she calls out to them and says, "Look what God gave me!" And I had to smile. So, we unloaded all the furniture. And there was no real furniture in the place at the time, and there were people living there. So, God put me there and put all the things together to allow her to have the furniture that she needed. It's strange, but that's what happened.

And the whole time I was always doing my own thing. I was doing whatever I wanted to. And always live life. Joined a gang, or whatever you want to call it. I was part of a lot of stuff. I've been involved in a lot of stuff... Going to prison, was life changing. It was a wake-up call. It was, "Okay, this could be me for the rest of my life." I've always felt like God sent to me who he wanted in my life. And right now, I have I went from like, just a wide circle of people. I'd hang with these groups, and then I hang with this group and-- no, now it's just down to chosen few. Because you never know. And I picked that up from prison. Because no matter what you do, there's always a consequence behind it.

My whole life-changing thing was when-- he'd come all the way from Iowa. Him and his wife, and they talked to prisoners. And it wasn't like, "Oh, so what's it like in there?" No, it was always, "Did you bring your Bible? Oh, that's okay. We'll read to you." And it was like... first it was like, "Okay... Whew! I get out my cell? You know, cool." And after a while, it was like, I was either getting programmed, or something inside me just woke up and said, "Yeah... That makes sense!" But every time we stopped talking, he said, "I want you to read Ezekiel 36:26. I want you to read that. And I want you to read that either to yourself or read it to someone else. Just read it." And I'd read that over and over again. And just, that right there. One day, I just literally dropped to my knees and submitted to God. "Okay, fine! Okay. Okay! I can't do this. I can't! Fine. Okay?" I was already five years in. But uh... that woke me up. Just that little part right there, because I get what they were trying to say, I just needed a new heart. I needed it. And I wouldn't accept anything less.

As you go about your day today, how do you see God at work?

Ezekiel 36:26 | "A new heart I will give you, and a new spirit I will put within you, and I will remove from your body the heart of stone and give you a heart of flesh."



Saturday, March 25 ST. MATTHEW'S LUTHERAN CHURCH, WAUWATOSA OFH Suburban Partner

Gloria Potter, Stephen Minister and OFH donor: I most profoundly felt God's presence in my life during a very difficult

season, when my husband's business went under, and he was dealing with depression and ways to cope with this loss. We were scheduling divorce proceedings, filing for bankruptcy, and selling our house.

I was teaching and in grad school, and it was a lot. Eventually, my own coping mechanisms were failing me, and I felt alone and desperate. I remember just getting in my car and asking, "God where do I go? I am so vulnerable right now and my path looks so dark." As I put my hands on the steering wheel, I knew there was a plan for me. I found myself in the parking lot of a psychiatric hospital. There, I received support through caring doctors, therapists, and medication. I talked, shared, journaled, and during those lonely nights, prayed so hard for guidance. Jesus was always walking with me, but now I was listening and allowing the healing to take place. After a two week stay, I remember walking out the hospital doors and seeing my little red car in the parking lot. I knew God had drawn me to this place to refresh me and move me forward.

I now am a Stephen Minister* at St Matthew's Lutheran Church. I often think that if I had had a Stephen Minister at that time, I would have felt the presence of God through that ministry. Maybe I wouldn't even have had this journey to share with you. Now, as I sit with someone and they share their story with me, I feel the presence of God in our relationship, and it is a reminder that our Gracious God is always present with us. I'd like to close with Hebrews chapter 13 verse 5: "God has said, never will I leave you; never will I forsake you."

As you go about your day today, how do you see God at work?

PRAYER | Dear Lord: Even in the worst moments of our lives, you are with us. Please watch over us and guide us toward your goodness and wellbeing, so that your love would flourish and grow in and through us. In your name, we pray. Amen.

I'm not gonna do that!" As a retired neurologist, I'm definitely more active in the ministry here at Cross, and in our Synod, just because now I have time, and I felt that God was calling me to actually participate in what our church is doing and see how I can contribute. And some of that is my upbringing. My mom and dad always said, "You were brought on this earth to do some good things." And I felt God wasn't done with me. I needed to do some more. And so, thinking about it, and actually talking to my spouse who said, "You know, you love those people. You enjoy those people. And you have so much that you can share with them and give them spiritually, but also from a health standpoint." So, God nudged me in a lot of ways. And I prayed about it, thought about it. Came here, experienced it, fell in love with the people, some of whom I knew when I was a kid, and some of them that I just met. So, I'm excited with what God is going to do here at the Cross Adult Center. Excited that He chose me and is going to allow me to hopefully help them to stay spiritually grounded with the help of Pastor Michelle here at the church. And allow me to help with some wellness, because that's a passion of mine, is wellness and brain health and keeping the brain healthy and maintaining cognitive function. So now I have people I can help with that, and I don't have to be their doctor. So, I'm excited to see what God's going to do!

Michelle "Micky" Glover, Adult Center Volunteer: Cross has been my only church home. I've been going here since I was two months. Baptized here. Went through confirmation here when I was in junior high. I was away a little bit when I started working as an adult, because I've worked for the state for 31 years. And when I retired, pastor said, "You know, I got something for you." So, I came back and started being a shopper for the food pantry. And then Linda Radder needed a cook. And then I promised her I'd help even though I can't cook a lick! [laughs] So, like I was saying, they would let me know what was donated on Mondays, and then I would look up recipes

and I'd come in and cook. And so far, it's worked out well! And when I would tell my family and friends that I was doing, they would be like, you know, "Dear God sent!" You know, they would say, because I would cook something, and they would actually eat it. And I'd be so surprised, because it turned out really good! So, it's helping me, it's helping them, and I'm starting to really enjoy it, actually! It was kind of rough at first, because standing on my feet for like eight hours, and the whole next day I'd be laying in bed. But then once you get used to it, then I kind of-- I like it! And it's part of my talent and time in addition to my tithe.

James Schatzman, Executive Director: Good morning! I am Jim Schatzman, Executive Director of Racine / Kenosha Vocational Ministry. We work with

people returning from prison who are working to become restored members of the community.

Endel was a dope dealer and a gang banger. He had already been to prison twice and he knew that a third time could mean as much as a 25-year sentence. As a child, he had suffered neglect, abuse, and was thrown out of school and abandoned to life in the streets. His foster parents, his father (who was in prison for murder), his mother, and the system had all given up on him. One elementary school psychologist labeled him a psychopath!

In Luke 13, Jesus tells a parable, "A man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard; and he came looking for fruit on it and found none. So he said to the gardener, 'See here! For three years I have come looking for fruit on this fig tree, and still I find none. Cut it down! Why should it be wasting the soil?' He replied, 'Sir, let it alone for one more year, until I dig around it and put manure on it. If it bears fruit next year, well and good; but if not, then you can cut it down.'" Someone had to give Endel one more year!

Second Corinthians reminds us that we are given the ministry of reconciliation and called to be restorers of the breaches in our community!

In the years since we met him in 2003, he has paid off over \$35,000 in child support, raised an honor roll student, teaches inmates in prison how to succeed on the outside, runs his own trucking business, and this year received a gubernatorial pardon. Endel is truly a new creation!

In his new life he is truly and asset to a community he formerly terrorized with drugs and violence!

And one of the first invitations that I had from the pastors here was to join them at community night at our urban partners in Milwaukee, St. Paul's Lutheran Church, on 28th and Wisconsin. Little did I know then, when I sat next to Kim Williams, the neighborhood minister, and had a conversation over dinner saying, "I've had all of this great stuff that I brought from California to New Jersey back to Wisconsin. Is there anybody here in the neighborhood that could use some of this gently used wonderful stuff?" And she did. So, the next month, took a couple of bags of gently used clothing, other items, and she knew who needed what and when in that neighborhood. Over the years, word spread within Galilee. And the third Wednesday of every month, we took a carload of gently used items down to St. Paul's. Every Christmas, we had our hat and mitten tree, where folks in the congregation donated, made, and shared wonderful hats, mittens and gloves that could keep folks warm.

So, in 2007, we lost Kim. She passed away unexpectedly. And that left a great hole in the hearts of us, and I'm sure in the hearts of the folks in the neighborhood of 28th and Wisconsin in Milwaukee. So, St. Paul's, our urban partner, formalized a ministry, and Kim's Closet was born in early 2009. Since then, it's expanded over the years. It expanded to two Wednesdays every month. They included new Threads of Hope, bringing new clothing to the folks in the neighborhood of 28th and Wisconsin. And even recently, with the pandemic, it kept going as a new version called Kim's Table. During the summer, Kim's Table was offered right out on Wisconsin Avenue. So, that community night meal where I sat next to Kim and had a table conversation, turned into a wonderful ministry that has lasted decades. And it was sometime later that we realized God was present at that table in that conversation.

Friday, March 31 EMAUS ELCA, RACINE OFH Ministry Partner

Rev. Jaime Dubon, Supply Pastor for Latino Ministries: Hi! I am Jaime Dubon, and I currently serve as supply pastor for Latino ministries at Emaus Lutheran in Racine.



I also serve as a member of the AMMPARO Executive Committee, the ELCA migration strategy. AMMPARO stands for "Accompanying Migrant [Minors] with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities." Last December, the AMMPARO Executive Committee met in San Diego, California. While in San Diego, we visited Friendship Park at the border. Our group was joined by members of the Pacifica Synod. We split in two groups: one on the Mexican side of the wall, and the other on the US side. We participated in the march of silence, along with members of the border church. This is the wall at the border that ends in the Pacific Ocean. The wall at this part of the border is an 18 feet metal mesh wall that allows people to see each other from both sides. They said that in the past, many Latinos living in the states who can't travel to their country of origin will come to this part of the wall to meet with their relatives from Mexico and from other countries throughout Latin America and the Caribbean. Parents will bring their children to meet their grandparents on the other side of the wall. And people with terminal illnesses will also come to the wall to say goodbye to their beloved ones.

Today, our government wants to tear down that metal mesh wall and build up the 30 feet brick and metal wall that former President Trump started several years ago. The march of silence intended to protest this intention. It was moving to see colleagues separated by a fence. We see each other, we shouted, but couldn't touch each other. "Peace and Friendship, yes! But not walls," we kept yelling. This experience was an important opportunity for me to learn more about conditions along our southern border and inspired us to work harder to safeguard protections for asylum seekers. And I am sure that God indeed was with me and with the others at the border. And he continues to work in the midst of this challenging situation. Because "truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me." Amen.

As you go about your day today, how do you see God at work?

Linda Riley, Council President: Hi. I want to talk about our awesome children's ministry. Here at Hephatha, every Tuesday and Sundays the kids



get together, and you don't have to be a member of the church to come. But the kids love coming to Tuesday praise. We get kids from all over within our area to just come and praise God, receive food and receive some love at the same time. And a lot of them come on Sundays also.

Well, one day, one particular Friday, me and Nurse Chris happened to be coming to Hephatha for a function that the homeless sanctuary was giving for their founder, Sister MacCanon. And food was to be served, but the food wasn't to be served for several hours. So while we was waiting outside to come into Sister MacCanon's celebration, we saw two young kids sitting on our stair steps here at the church! And we approached 'em, they couldn't be no more from ages three to six, a little boy and his little sister. And we approached them, we said "hello" and they just said "hi." They would not tell us their names. They would not tell us their parent's name. And when we asked them where they lived, they pointed, they pointed north. That means they lived across the street, north from the church. All they told us was they were hungry, and they were told to come here to get food. So me and Nurse Chris was like, "What we gonna do?" Immediately, Nurse Chris went downstairs to see, did we have anything that we could give them right away? And all we had was just a couple crackers or some cookies. So we happened to look-- we saw that one of our church members, Ruby, who lives across the street from the church, happened to be at home. And Nurse Chris said, "let me go see if Ruby have anything." Ruby came home on her lunch break! So we explained the situation to Ruby. Right away, Ruby, who's raising her grandson on her own, she has snacks and everything kids prefer. She made up the biggest lunch for them kids, hot and cold, and she bagged it. And Nurse Chris came out, gave the lunches to the kids, walked them back across the busy street-- because Locust is a busy street, and a lot of people just don't cross Locust -- and then the kids went on their way. And that was a God moment right there, for all of us to be in that position. 'Cause kids from miles around know, if they're hungry, they know to come here to eat.

As you go about your day today, how do you see God at work?

PRAYER | God of love and care, we pray for all those who hunger for physical daily bread to nourish their bodies. We especially pray for hungry children. We pray for all those, like Ruby, who feed children on daily basis and make sure their next meal is a good meal. This Lenten season, increase our hunger for you and satisfy our hunger for you by using us to feed you as you come to us in the form of the hungry children of our City. We ask this in the name of Jesus, who feeds us with his very body and blood and tends our every need. Amen.



Tuesday, April 4 - Holy Week ST. PAUL'S LUTHERAN CHURCH, MILWAUKEE OFH Ministry Partner

Rev. Delaney Schlake-Kruse: My name is Pastor Delaney Schlake-Kruse, and I serve St. Paul's Lutheran Church at 2812 West Wisconsin Avenue in the City of Milwaukee.

Over the past three years, we have received money from Outreach for Hope to help us grow deeper relationships with those in our neighborhood. Our neighborhood is a densely populated area between 27th and 35th streets, and Wisconsin and Highland Boulevard. There's a lot of folks who live there, and a lot of organizations in our neighborhood. So, over the past three years -- four years, really -- we have been working to get to know the people who are serving our neighbors alongside us. In an effort to do that, Outreach for Hope has helped us to buy gifts from black-owned businesses in the City of Milwaukee, to share with our neighbors, to make that first connection.

This year, one of the organizations that we visited as a congregation was the Red Cross. Back in the 90's, our congregation was a shelter for the Red Cross. When people were in times of crisis or emergency, perhaps in case of an apartment fire, we would host them. Families would come and sleep in the basement of St. Paul's, housed by the Red Cross, through our congregation's building. We haven't done that in a long time. But as we've been seeking to grow more deeply rooted in our neighborhood again, after a long time being there, we connected with the Red Cross. We took some treats and shared them (bagels from Ruby's Bagels here in Milwaukee) and visited with the staff people of the Red Cross, over the summer. We learned more about what they do, how they serve our neighborhood. They're just around the corner on Wisconsin, next door to the church. And we learned about the opportunity to become a host again, for people in emergency situations. And so, after that initial contact, we continued to talk back and forth, and our Council decided that our church ought to and would like to follow the call that God had extended to us, as we get to know our neighbors, to become an emergency shelter again.

And so, a week before Christmas, a person from the staff of the Red Cross came to St. Paul's, and met with our office manager and myself. He looked around the building, and we showed him where people would be sleeping if they were to come to St. Paul's. And we showed him the community spaces where people could gather and warm up and rest in a time of chaos. And the Red Cross determined that we were a good spot for them! And so, we have now entered fully into this agreement, where St Paul's can be a crisis space-- as well as our neighbors down the street, Redeemer, entered into [the agreement].

This type of engagement in our neighborhood is a way that we follow the Holy Spirit at St. Paul's. We really want to be planted where we are. My internship supervisor told me when I was in seminary, "If you want to know where God has called you, look at your feet." And so, as we look at our feet, so to speak, in the congregation, and we recognize where God has placed us for the last 180 years as a church-- but especially in this particular place since 1917. We want to follow God. We want to respond to the Holy Spirit's invitation to get to know the people who live there.

And in so doing, we have had so many incredible God sightings! I could tell you all day about the ways that God has been present in this journey of meeting our neighbors more fully over the last three to four years. But this experience of the Red Cross gives us an opportunity to respond to God's call, to serve our neighbors—to do the Matthew 25 thing and try to have some folks who need somewhere to sleep, to feed somebody who might be hungry. Really, to offer a compassionate space for people in crisis, when their home has been destroyed or is uninhabitable for a time being, that they can come and be warm and be safe at 28th and Wisconsin, in the church building that God has given us to share with our neighborhood.

The God sighting to me is the openness, the generosity in our community, and the spaces that are filled by the Holy Spirit's connection that helps a church like ours-- a beautiful, vibrant, small congregation --to connect with our neighbors in meaningful ways, and to build a mutual relationship, where people can be served, where people can experience the love and grace of God. And we can share what we have with one another.

So, this Lent, I hope for more God sightings to be made apparent to all of us throughout the Greater Milwaukee Synod! As we notice, as we look at our feet and see where God has called, and recognize what opportunities exist in our own theological neighborhoods or our own physical neighborhoods, whether at home or at church. There's so many connections that the Holy Spirit is just waiting to make!

As you go about your day today, how do you see God at work?

PRAYER | Heavenly God: As our Creator, you know us better than anyone else. Throughout our life, you have helped us form relationships. Remind us that you are at the center of these connections. Help us resolve any conflicts we may experience and continually remember to forgive as we are forgiven. May we look to you for wisdom and guidance, love and hope. In Jesus' name we pray, Amen.

After I smudged the Knee, an elder came up to me and said, "I knew you were here." He thanked me for smudging the Knee. He told me some of his family were buried here at the Knee. He said, "I appreciate you coming from so far." And he proceeded to share his stories with me.

At the time, I truly believe God put me there for a reason. This is the most spiritual connection I've ever felt in life. It gave me the strength to move forward in a positive way, and just stand tall and help others where needed. I truly believe we can help each other make a difference. Thank you!

Thursday, April 6 - Maundy Thursday BREAKING THE CHAINS CHURCH, MILWAUKEE OFH Ministry Partner

Rev. David Rebey: Good evening, everybody! I'm David Rebey. I am the pastor of Breaking the Chains Church at

the Felmers Chaney Correctional Center and at the Kenosha Correctional Center as well.

Last night, I was inside the Felmers Chaney Center with another one of our volunteers, Greg Wajerski, for Bible study with four of our regular participants. We were about halfway through the Bible study, when a new man walked up to the table and asked if he could join us. One of our regular participants introduced him and said that he had invited this man to come. He was glad that he came. And he also shared with us that he had been through a pretty difficult time in the last couple of weeks since Christmas. He didn't tell us why. But he told us that he really thought that this guy would benefit from being with us. And immediately when he sat down, he started adding to the Bible study and offering his own reflections and was a very engaged participant.

When our Bible study came to an end, at about the one hour mark, the man who had introduced him asked us if we could all gather around him and place our hands on his shoulder and say a prayer for him. I didn't know why we were praying, but we prayed for him together. And we could all tell, I think, that he needed our prayer, and then he found some comfort from being with us.

Later, as we were walking out the door, the security guard on duty asked me if that man had ever been with us before. And I said, "No, it was his first time." And he went on to share with me and Greg that he was glad that he came, and that this man had lost his son in a drive-by shooting the week after Christmas, and had been going through a real difficult time... I cannot imagine what it feels like to lose a loved one, particularly a young son, while you are incarcerated. But as I drove home last night, I kept thinking about Matthew 18:20, where Jesus said, "For where two or three of them are gathered in my name, I am among them." We were where we needed to be last night, and Christ was with us. I hope that that man joins us again.

As you go about your day today, how do you see God at work?

MATTHEW 5:3-10 | "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted. Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the land. Blessed are they who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be satisfied. Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy. Blessed are the clean of heart, for they will see God. Friday, April 7 - Good Friday EMAUS ELCA, RACINE OFH Ministry Partner

Soledad Beltran, Council President: It's no secret that God often answers our prayers in ways we don't expect. September 11, 2022 was one of those moments when nothing seemed to be in



our favor. The weather forecast called for rain. How much rain? We had no idea. So, when the clouds rolled in and rain started to fall, we just took it in stride. That was, until we realized this wasn't going to be a normal rainfall.

You see, our church building as well as our parsonage are getting old, and there are many leaks. All of which become concerning when the amount of rain exceeds an inch or more. So, it goes without saying that the 9.6 inches of rain that fell that day left us in a bit of a mess. Or should we say, a big mess.

Between the church building and our parsonage, we found ourselves looking at over \$12,000 in damages, all of which could not be put off and repaired later. With no idea of how we we're going to pay for the repairs, we went ahead and scheduled them anyways. One could say that we were relying on the manna from heaven that has kept this congregation thriving for years.

With heartfelt prayers, we decided that we would send out a plea to our members and community friends, describing the situation, urging all to prayerfully consider ways in which they could help. It was our hope that we would be able to raise at least half of the deficit.

Never in a million year did we expected the response we received. Within a couple of days, checks started to roll in. Some of which came from unexpected sources, but all of which left us amazed. It's crazy how much we put limits on God's amazing Grace sometimes!

Our limited hopes of raising half the repair money were surpassed by over \$12,000, This left us with yet another dilemma. What would we do with the extra money that was so generously given?

For a moment we hoped we would be able to raise enough additional funds to cover the estimated cost of \$36,000 to repair our front entranceway that we had been lamenting

and putting off for years due to a lack of funding. But reality set in, and we knew that \$36,000 was too steep of a climb for us.

However, when God is at work, all things are possible with a little faith and a whole lot of GRACE. You see, that storm that blew through Sept 11th brought about more than rain damage. It cleared a pathway to new possibilities. Through hours of brainstorming, we learned that our council president's brother, who works in construction, was coming from Mexico to visit for a few weeks, leaving us to question whether he would be willing to help us repair our entranceway at a cost that was more within our means? For that, we would have to wait and see. And see, we did, as we stood by watching our entranceway be transform back to its original state!

We find it to be no coincidence that the extra \$7,000 that had been raised just happened to be the amount that was needed to complete the repairs.

Jesus teaches us not to be anxious, but to ask God for what we need. That often is much easier said than done. But in the face of the proverbial and literal storm, we were reminded once again that God does answer prayers... not always in the timeframe we demand, or the in the way we want, but always in the way that is needed. Thanks be to God!
